

# Campaign Finance Reporting: 42<sup>nd</sup> General Election

## Legislative Background

Under *The Election Financing Act* (EFA), candidates and registered parties must report their financial activity during an election by filing a financial statement with Elections Manitoba. Public reporting by political entities provides for fairness and transparency in the political process.

In 2017, a bill to amend the EFA came into effect, making several changes to campaign finance provisions for the 2019 general election.

Changes to the legislation are summarized as follows:

### Contributions

- Contribution limits increased to \$5,000 from \$3,000 and are indexed to inflation after each fixed date general election.
- Fees paid to attend a conference, convention or leadership convention count as a contribution.
- The definition of volunteer services includes the services of a self-employed individual.
- Cash contributions are limited to \$25 or less.

### Limits

- Advertising limits apply to a 90-day pre-election period in the year of a fixed date election.
- Advertising costs include paid advertising only; promotional costs are not included.
- Base spending limits for registered parties and candidates are set using the preliminary voters list from the current general election.

### Filing

- Constituency associations must now file an annual unaudited financial statement each year. Previously, they were only required to report on contributions and loans.

**Third Party**

- Third parties must register with Elections Manitoba when they incur \$2,500 in expenses during the pre-election period or during the election period.
- Third party spending limits increase to \$25,000 during an election period, with an additional limit of \$100,000 for the 90-day pre-election period.
- The definition “election communication” that applies to third parties is expanded to include communications about issues associated with a political party or a candidate.
- Third party expenses that are made with the consent and knowledge of a registered party will be considered part of the registered party’s advertising expenses and go against the party’s advertising limit.

**Reimbursement**

- Amount of reimbursement to candidates and parties for eligible election expenses reduced from 50% to 25%.
- Percent of votes required to be eligible for reimbursement reduced from 10% to 5%.

## Reporting by Candidates

Candidates must report on their income and expenses from the date they file nomination papers under the EFA or have their nominations accepted under *The Elections Act* (EA) until two months after election day (candidacy period).

Candidate returns must include:

- auditor’s report
- income, transfers and expenses
- assets and liabilities
- contributions
- supporting documentation

In total, 240 candidates (235 official candidates and five who withdrew) and seven registered parties were required to file returns for the 2019 general election by the filing deadline, January 10, 2020.

Of the candidate returns, 135 were received by the deadline, 103 extensions were granted and two campaigns were assessed late fees at the time of the initial deadline. In total there were seven late filing fees assessed.

## Reporting by Registered Parties

Registered parties report on financial activity from writ day until two months after election day (campaign period).

Registered parties are required to file:

- auditor's report
- audited statement of income, transfers and expenses

Of the registered party returns, six were received by the deadline and one was assessed a late filing fee.

## Expense Limits for Candidates and Registered Parties

Expense limits ensure all political participants operate on a level playing field. The amount a candidate or a party can spend during an election is limited by the EFA in two ways:

- Total Election Expenses — the total value of election expenses incurred during an election period
- Total Advertising Expenses — the total value of advertising expenses incurred during an election period

Advertising election expenses are subject to a separate limit but are also included in the total election expense limit. The election and advertising expense limits are calculated by multiplying two factors:

- an expense limit per registered voter
- the number of voters on the voters list in an electoral division

The new 90-day pre-election advertising expense limits were not in effect for the 2019 general election because it was not a fixed date election.

For parties, the expense limits are calculated by multiplying the total number of registered voters by the expense limit per registered voter. If they do not nominate a candidate in each of the 57 electoral divisions, the limit is reduced to reflect the number of actual candidates nominated.

For candidates, the expense limits are calculated by multiplying the number of registered voters within the electoral division by the expense limit per registered voter.

**Note:** Election spending by candidates is reported in the appendix.

## Contributions

The EFA places restrictions on political contributions. Contributors must be individuals that live in Manitoba. They must use their own money, without expectation of reimbursement. Individuals must not contribute more than \$5,000 in aggregate to all political entities in a calendar year. An exception is a leadership contest, where an additional \$3,000 limit per leadership contest is allowed.

Contributions may be monetary, in the form of cash, cheque or credit card, or non-monetary. The latter includes property and services provided free of charge and at fair market value.

When reporting on contributions, candidates must provide the name and residential address of contributors, the amount and date of contribution. The contributions received by parties are reported in the financial statements on page 41.

Once their nominations become official, candidates may register to issue tax receipts for contributions. Elections Manitoba provides numbered tax receipts and a unique tax registration number for their use. Registered parties and registered candidates must issue a tax receipt for any contribution over \$10.

The following table shows the number of candidates, by affiliation, who registered to issue tax receipts for 2019.

## Reimbursements

Qualified candidates and registered parties may be reimbursed for up to 25% of eligible election expenses. Candidates qualify if they receive at least 5% of the valid votes in their electoral division and parties qualify if the candidates they endorse receive at least 5% of the votes in the election.

Election expenses are resources used during the election period, that is, from the date the writ was issued, August 12, until 8:00 pm on election day. Non-monetary expenses are not reimbursed but do count towards the spending limit allotted to each candidate and party.

Candidates who receive at least 5% of the vote in their electoral division are also reimbursed for 100% of their reasonable child care and disability-related expenses. Reasonable expenses are those over and above the expenses normally incurred by the candidate. In certain circumstances, depending on the surplus status of a candidate's campaign, some or all of the candidate's reimbursement is paid directly to the endorsing registered party.

In the 2019 general election, there were 201 candidates and four registered parties eligible for reimbursement, compared to 155 candidates and three registered parties in the previous election. This was due to the decrease in the percentage of votes received required to be eligible for reimbursement from 10% to 5%.

## Auditor Subsidies by Affiliation

An auditor is paid a subsidy of up to \$1,500 for auditing a candidate's election financial statement and a maximum of \$30,000 for a registered party's election financial statement.

## Third Parties

Third party rules promote fairness through limits on spending by individuals and interest groups that may influence public opinion during an election. The EFA defines a third party as a person or group (other than a registered party, candidate or constituency association) that promotes or opposes a registered party or candidate during an election.

Third parties must not spend more than \$25,000 on election communication during the election period. An additional limit of \$100,000 is set for the pre-election period in the year of a fixed date election. The new pre-election expense limits were not in effect in 2019 because it was not a fixed date election.

Once a third party has spent \$2,500 on election communication, they must register with Elections Manitoba.

An election communication is any communication with the public during an election that supports or opposes a candidate or party. Some exceptions apply, as outlined in section 82 of the EFA.

Three third parties registered during the 2019 general election and filed their return: Canadian Union of Public Employees – Manitoba (CUPE – Manitoba), Make Poverty History Manitoba and Unifor. Following an investigation by the Commissioner of Elections, Merit Contractors Association was deemed a third party and, accordingly, filed an election expense report. The following table outlines the election expense report for Merit Contractors Association:

### **Financial Compliance Review Services**

An additional \$86,500 of operational expenses were incurred in the fiscal year 2020-21 for compliance review services. These services were provided for the 2019 general election. Elections Manitoba reported on financial compliance review services up to March 31, 2020 in the 2019 annual report.



## Annual Activities

### MANITOBA VOTER REGISTER ACTIVITIES

First used for the 2018 St. Boniface byelection, the Manitoba Voter Register is a permanent voters list managed by Elections Manitoba. The register links every voter to a Manitoba address. By linking voter and address information, the register assigns each voter to a poll and polling place within an electoral division. Elections Manitoba regularly receives voter information from third-party sources, including Elections Canada, Manitoba Public Insurance (MPI), Manitoba Health, and Vital Statistics.

The Manitoba Voter Register is maturing and becoming more accurate, complete and current since it was built in 2018. Elections Manitoba has undertaken considerable work to review data, improve accuracy, identify duplicates and continue with the data matching cycle we have with our data partners.

### ACTIVITIES RELATED TO *THE ELECTIONS ACT (EA)*

#### Working with Advisory Committees

Elections Manitoba consults with representatives from all registered parties annually on matters related to *The Elections Act (EA)* and *The Election Financing Act (EFA)*. The advisory committees are legislated under each Act.

#### The EA Advisory Committee

The EA advisory committee met three times in 2020. We adapted the format of the first two meetings in response to the public health regulations in effect, replacing the traditional format with a series of email exchanges. In our April meeting, we sought advice and suggestions from committee members on the proposed recommendations from Elections Manitoba's 2019 annual report.

Annual Report Recommendations discussed included:

- **Voters lists:** Establish a consistent voters list format for annual, preliminary, revised and final lists; providing the voters list to candidates upon request; the ability to include the most up-to-date voter information in the final voters list, including changes of address.
- **Accessible voting:** Make a special ballot available in returning offices from the time the writ is issued to the start of advance voting; and offer telephone voting as an option for absentee and homebound voters.

- **Modernization:** Extend leave provisions to office staff required to run returning offices; and allow for electronic signatures when filing certain documents.
- **Recommendation carried forward:** Establish a common addressing standard for the province.

In the July meeting, Elections Manitoba sought input from committee members on the following topics:

- **Vote-by-mail:** A discussion paper on a contingency plan to use a vote-by-mail model in the case of a byelection being called when public health orders are in place that limit public interaction.
- **Telephone Voting:** A recommendation to provide a telephone voting option for absentee voters, specifically members of the Canadian Armed Forces, and to enhance accessibility for voters with a disability.
- **Voters List Guidelines:** Updated guidelines on use of the voters list to strengthen privacy and security for voters.

A third meeting was held in November to present and seek feedback on the *Vote Anywhere in Your Electoral Division on Election Day* proposal, including the introduction of an online portal for parties to receive updates on who has voted.

### Processing Annual Financial Returns

Registered parties and constituency associations are required to disclose their annual financial activities to demonstrate compliance and maintain transparency with the public. Candidates must also report on outstanding liabilities and loan status.

## Registered Party Filing

The filing deadline for 2019 annual statements was March 31, 2020 unless Elections Manitoba approved an extension. Statements were filed as follows:

Constituency associations must file an unaudited statement, including a detailed listing of contributions as part of their annual reporting requirements. An annual contribution to the constituency association totaling \$250 or more is public information.

## Manitoba Tax Credits Claimed For Political Contributions

Only registered candidates and parties may issue tax receipts for contributions. The tax receipts may be used to claim tax credits as per section 4.11(1.) of *The Income Tax Act*. An individual's political contribution tax credit for a taxation year ending after 2019 is the lesser of \$1,000 and the amount determined according to the following table:

Total contribution (T)	Political contribution credit (PCC)
\$400 or less	$PCC = .75 \times T$
More than \$400 but not more than \$750	$PCC = \$300 + (T - \$400)/2$
More than \$750	$PCC = \$475 + (T - \$750)/3$

## The EFA Advisory Committee

Following public health advice to limit in-person gatherings, the EFA Advisory Committee was held via a series of emails in late April. In the exchange, Elections Manitoba sought feedback on the following new and previously made recommendations:

- Adopting electronic signatures
- Changing the deadline for constituency association annual financial statements
- Disability and child care expenses reimbursement
- Changes to the late filing fee recovery period

Members were also advised of dates and topics for upcoming compliance information sessions, procedures for official agents in managing candidates' finances, authorization of political advertising and new reporting requirements for constituency associations.

## PUBLIC INTEREST DISCLOSURE

*The Public Interest Disclosure Act*, known as Whistleblower Protection, came into effect in April 2007. There have been no disclosures within Elections Manitoba, although the organization remains fully aware of the Act and is ready to ensure its regulations are met should an employee come forward with a concern.

No disclosures were received by Elections Manitoba for fiscal years 2019 - 2020 or 2020 - 2021.



## COMMISSIONER OF ELECTIONS

Sections 92(1) & (2), of *The Election Financing Act* (EFA) regulates the kind of information a government department or Crown agency can publish or advertise leading up to and during elections and byelections.

Any person who believes that a department or Crown agency has violated section 92 may file a complaint with the commissioner of elections.

Section 93 of the EFA requires that, if the commissioner of elections finds that a complaint is justified, the commissioner must advise the chief electoral officer of the particulars of the violation, which are then published in the annual report.

The commissioner of elections provided the following information on a breach of section 92(1) of *The Election Financing Act*:

The Department of Health wrongly published information about its programs and activities during the election period of the September 10, 2019 general election. Specifically, during that period, the Department of Health published an update regarding a series of ongoing changes in the Health Care system. The commissioner received and investigated a complaint. He found that, although there was no intent to promote the government's activities, the publication was nonetheless a breach of section 92(1) of *The Election Financing Act*.

## DEVELOPING STAFF AND SHARING BEST PRACTICES

Elections Manitoba regularly participates in professional development activities that reflect our areas of strategic focus. To enhance service, support innovation and foster engagement, staff from Elections Manitoba participated a variety of opportunities. Most of these were shifted to virtual activities due to the pandemic. A summary of these activities follows:

### Provincial

With the employment standard of *The Accessibility for Manitobans* coming into effect in 2020, Elections Manitoba staff attended a workshop on accessible employment.

### National

CEO Shipra Verma serves on the Secretariat on Electoral Coordination (SEC) steering committee and is also the Chair of Canadian Society of Election Official Training (CSEOT).

Ms. Verma attended a meeting of the Advisory Committee of Electoral Partners, an annual meeting of Canadian chief electoral officers.

In 2020, Elections Manitoba staff participated in a sub-committee of the SEC examining deceptive online practices in the context of elections. The goal of the sub-committee is to identify shared tools and resources that election management bodies can use to recognize and mitigate inaccurate and misleading activities online that may compromise election integrity.

Staff also participated in training programs offered by CSEOT both as trainers and learners. A focus of training in 2020 was the conduct of elections during a pandemic. Staff also attended workshops on regulating political communications in the social media context.

### **International**

Ms. Verma held a consultation with the Election Commissioner of India, Shri Sunil Arora. They discussed potential collaborations specifically in the areas of election official training and learning programs.

Staff participated in the annual conference of the Council on Governmental Ethics and Law (COGEL) which was held virtually in December.

## Other Activities

### Electoral Division Statistical Profiles

Elections Manitoba updated its website with electoral division statistical profiles. The information was prepared by the Manitoba Bureau of Statistics based on the 2016 Census information collected in Manitoba. The profiles outline information such as population, median age, employment income, education and average family size. The profiles also include maps and election information from Elections Manitoba and follow the official boundaries determined by the 2018 Electoral Divisions Boundaries Commission.

### Online Education Resources

Due to the pandemic, Elections Manitoba has been unable to offer Your Power to Choose (YPTC) in-class workshops. Instead, we made all of the program materials available online. This includes the entire YPTC Education Guide, YPTC Adult Education Guide, and standalone lessons and activities organized by grade.

Additionally, Elections Manitoba, in collaboration with provincial and territorial electoral agencies and Elections Canada, developed a new civic education resource for senior years teachers on the three levels of government and elections. The resource is available on the Elections Manitoba website.

## Looking Forward to 2021

### **Vote Anywhere Proposal**

Elections Manitoba will present a demonstration of the *Vote Anywhere in Your Electoral Division on Election Day* early in 2021 to the Standing Committee on Legislative Affairs and all MLAs. The presentation will demonstrate the proposed voting model and the new technology used to support it.

If approved by the committee, the next steps will include adapting processes, revising training materials, and procuring the required technology.

### **First Annual Registration Drive**

Elections Manitoba will hold a voter registration drive in the fall of 2021. Due to uncertainty around the COVID-19 pandemic, no in-person events are being considered. The registration drive will mark the United Nations International Day of Democracy, September 15.

### **Returning Officer Recruitment**

A recruitment campaign will begin in the fall for returning officers (ROs), assistant returning officers (AROs) and support staff for the next general election. The recruitment campaign will include direct outreach to staff who worked previous elections.

### **Streamlining Campaign Finance Reporting and Review**

Development of a web-based recordkeeping tool to assist registered parties with their filing requirements will be completed in 2021, in time for the annual reporting deadline. Elections Manitoba launched a similar tool in the 2019 general election for official agents to manage candidate's finances. Data entered by candidates and parties into the recordkeeping tool will then be synced into a new application also in development, that will centralize the review of returns by Elections Manitoba. The final phase of this project will be a version of the recordkeeping tool for constituency associations.

### **Training Updates**

Work will begin on updating Elections Manitoba's Learning Management System (LMS) and other training materials to reflect new processes and legislation in place for the next election. The first training session for ROs, AROs and support staff is planned for May 2022.

## Recommendations

The chief electoral officer may recommend amendments to Manitoba’s electoral law in order to improve and/or update the electoral process and better serve the electorate. The chief electoral officer’s recommendations are published in Elections Manitoba’s annual reports.

The CEO consults with the advisory committees when drafting recommendations; however, what is ultimately recommended is at the sole discretion of the chief electoral officer.

**Note:** Elections Manitoba presented the proposed voting model, *Vote Anywhere in Your Electoral Division on Election Day*, along with associated recommendations to the Standing Committee on Legislative Affairs in 2020.

### ***The Elections Act:*** **Recommendations Carried Forward**

#### **Election Administration Modernization**

##### a) Modifications to the Electoral Process

As reported in the previous section, Elections Manitoba implemented three modifications to the electoral process in 2019, as follows:

- i. Allow for real-time strike-off during advance voting
- ii. Change the advance voting book format to allow for labels to be printed and pasted into the book instead of hand writing voters’ names
- iii. Combine the voters list and voting book for use on election day

**Recommendation:** That these modifications be permanently included in legislation through amendments to *The Elections Act*. It is further recommended that amendments should reflect the possibility of extending the technological modifications made in advance voting to election day, with review and approval of the Standing Committee on Legislative Affairs.

##### b) Electronic Signature

**Recommendation:** To accept electronic signatures to allow for the electronic filing of forms under *The Elections Act*.

**Background:** Multiple forms for voters and candidates are currently available on the Elections Manitoba website in a fillable format but require an “ink” signature. This means that users can complete the form on their computer, but must print them out, sign their name, and scan the signed form in order to send it. The use of an electronic signature would eliminate the need for printing

and scanning, thereby enhancing service, and increase efficiency in receiving and processing these forms. By making the forms completely electronic, Elections Manitoba would be meeting voter expectations of providing a full online service for the completion and submission of forms.

### **Voters List Efficiency**

a) Provide consistent voters list information to registered parties - sections 63.8(2), 74(2), 75(2), 89(3), 176

Recommendation: That voters list content be standardized throughout the legislation so that consistent information is provided to registered parties at all phases of the election as well as on an annual basis.

Background: Currently *The Elections Act* sets out different categories of information to be included in the annual, preliminary, revised and final voters list, all of which are provided to registered parties. The mailing address, for example, is not required to be included in all lists. By standardizing the information given to registered parties, all voters lists can be produced in a consistent format, making the process more consistent, reducing the potential for error and improving service to stakeholders. It is, therefore, recommended that the annual, preliminary, revised and final voters list be consistent.

b) Provide a voters list to candidates upon request - sections 75(1), 89(3)

Recommendation: To remove the requirement that returning officers provide the preliminary and revised voters lists to all candidates in their electoral division, so that lists only be provided to candidates on request.

Background: *The Elections Act* requires returning officers to provide a copy of the preliminary and revised voters lists to all candidates. Under current provisions, returning officers prepare voters lists for all candidates in their electoral division, but experience shows that candidates are using voter information provided by their registered party. Fewer and fewer candidates are picking up the lists produced by the returning officer, resulting in excess copies in the office.

Providing a voters list upon request ensures that a list is always available to candidates, eliminates unnecessary creation of duplicate voter information, reinforces access controls and upholds privacy provisions.

### c) Final Voters List - section 176

**Recommendation:** To include the most up-to-date information available at the end of election day in the final voters list. This would expand the scope of changes that returning officers can make to the voters list after election day, by including updates and corrections provided by voters themselves.

**Background:** The current legislation only allows voters to be added to the final voters list, but doesn't allow for moves, corrections or updates received from the voter, such as a name or address change. The Manitoba Voter Register allows staff to easily update the voters list with information provided directly from voters on election day. Staff can add voters who swear on at a voting opportunity, and they can quickly and accurately move a voter, correct errors in a voter record, and update voter information. This would enhance the quality of the final voters list.

## **Voter Service and Accessibility**

### **Telephone Voting**

**Recommendation:** To introduce a telephone voting option for absentee voters unable to return their ballot by mail in time to be counted, as well as an additional voting option for voters with a disability and their caregivers and for Canadian Armed Forces stationed overseas.

**Background:** Absentee voting allows voters who will be outside the province or remote from their voting location during advance and election day to cast their ballot. A voting package is sent to the voter and it is their responsibility to return their ballot by 8:00 pm on election day.

Some absentee voters do not have a fixed address while traveling or are travelling in areas where they are not able to receive or return their ballot in the time provided. There have been cases in past election of ballots returned too late to be counted.

The ability to vote by phone would allow an absentee voter to quickly and easily cast their ballot before the close of voting on election day, with appropriate security and process measures. The option to vote by phone would also facilitate the voting of Canadian Armed Forces members serving outside of Canada.

Telephone voting would also enhance accessibility to the electoral process for voters with a disability and their caregivers. Under current legislation, voters who cannot go to a voting station due to a disability or because they are caring for someone who is unable to leave their home may apply for homebound voting. The option to vote by phone would further enhance service to voters, reduce barriers and allow voters more independence in casting their ballot.

### **Leave to Participate in Elections — Elections Office Staff - section 17(1)**

Recommendation: That the leave given to office staff and interpreters to work in a returning office be consistent with the leave timelines for registration agents.

Background: Registration agents can begin unpaid leave to work in a returning office 75 days before a fixed date election in order to conduct targeted registration. Currently, leave for office staff and interpreters does not begin until the election is called. As a result, staff who take leave from other employment to work during the election are not in place to support registration activity.

Aligning the leave of absence for office staff with that of registration agents would improve voter registration efforts that occur before an election is called.

## ***The Election Financing Act*** **Recommendations Carried Forward**

### **Reporting by Constituency Association — Section 64**

Recommendation: To amend section 64 by changing the date for a constituency association to file their annual financial statement from January 31 to March 31.

Background: In 2016, Elections Manitoba recommended that constituency associations be required to file an unaudited financial statement providing an overview of their financial position at the end of each year and, if requested by the chief electoral officer, any other sources of funding. The rationale for this recommendation was to enhance transparency of funding to political participants by allowing for the reconciliation of transfers between constituency associations and both candidates and registered parties.

This recommendation was implemented in legislation in 2017 and constituency associations first reported in 2018 with a deadline of January 31.

Since the change in reporting requirements, Elections Manitoba has had discussions with advisory committee representatives and financial officers of constituency associations about adjusting the timing of filing the financial statements. By making the reporting deadline consistent with that of registered parties, the financial officers would be able to file more accurate information, reducing the need to later amend their statements. This would make the process more efficient for the constituency associations.

### **Late Filing Fee: Constituency Association — Section 70(2)**

Recommendation: To update section 70(2) to reflect the change in filing deadline recommended under section 64.



Background: Under current legislation, a constituency association's financial officer that fails to file a statement required under section 64 by February 28 of each year must pay the chief electoral officer a late filing fee of \$25 for each day the failure continues.

If section 64 were amended as recommended above, the date after which the late filing fee would come into effect would be April 30.

This would be a consequential amendment due to changing in reporting of the constituency association.

### **Electronic Signature**

Recommendation: It is recommended that electronic signatures be accepted to allow for the electronic filing of forms under *The Election Financing Act*. Multiple forms are currently available electronically but require an "ink" signature. The use of an electronic signature would improve the efficiency in receiving and processing these forms, and make it easier for users to send in required information.

### **Reimbursement: 100% Reasonable Disability and Child Care expenses to all Candidates – Section 74**

Recommendation: To amend section 74(1) to provide reimbursement of reasonable child care and disability expenses to all candidates, not just those who receive 5% of the valid votes.

Background: In order to further support participation in the electoral process, both by potential candidates with disabilities and those with young children, we are proposing that the reimbursement for disability-related expenses and child care expenses be provided to all candidates, not just those who receive 5% of the valid votes.

As the organization responsible for ensuring all eligible Manitobans have the opportunity to participate in elections, Elections Manitoba is committed to identifying and removing barriers to full participation by voters and candidates. Currently, candidates must receive a minimum of 5% of the valid votes to be eligible to receive reimbursement.

This recommendation would remove a potential barrier to participation for candidates with a disability or those who have young children by ensuring the reimbursement would be available to all eligible candidates, regardless of the electoral outcome.

## Recoverability of Late Filing Fees — Section 70

Recommendation: To amend section 70 to include a time period for recovery of late filing fees, in order to apply the late filing fees more effectively. Accordingly, the section should be amended to state that the late filing fee must be paid within 30 days of receiving the notice from the chief electoral officer.

Background: A person who fails to file information, a statement, report or record by the filing deadline is subject to a late filing fee. Once the filing deadline has passed, a late filing fee is assessed at \$25 per day for each day the failure continues, to a maximum of 30 days. The person is notified of the amount payable once the information is received or, if the information has not been received, once the deadline has passed.

The payment deadline for late filing fee is currently not specified in the legislation. In practice, however, we request the payment be made in 30 days, which is consistent with other filing requirements. In order to clarify the timeline for payment of late filing fees, it is recommended the section be amended to specify a 30-day period.

## Other Recommendation Relevant to the Conduct of Elections: Carried Forward

### Establish a Single Address Authority for Manitoba

A permanent voter register must correctly link a voter to an address. Manitoba does not currently have consistent address conventions. Consistency in addressing, including street names and address format, allow for the validation and matching necessary to assign a voter to an electoral division and polling place. It also impacts the accuracy of voter information provided to candidates and parties.

Differences in address conventions can lead to inconsistencies that may impact the quality of the register and the voters lists that are produced. These inconsistencies may result in voters not being assigned to the appropriate polling place.

A single address authority would improve efficiency not just for electoral purposes; public safety would also be impacted, as fire, ambulance, and police services would use standardized addresses.
