

Accessibility: A Guide to Voting Options


A byelection is coming this summer in the electoral division of St. Boniface.

Elections Manitoba is committed to accessibility for all Manitoba voters.

Who can vote?

You can vote if you:

- Are a Canadian citizen;
- Are at least 18 years of age on election day;
- Have lived in Manitoba for at least six months before election day; and
- Live in the St. Boniface electoral division



How do I register to vote?

- Elections Manitoba maintains a register of voters.
- To check if you are on the list, contact Elections Manitoba by phone at 204-945-3225 or by email at election@elections.mb.ca.
- Registered voters will receive a Voter Information Card in the mail once the election is called.
- Even if you don't receive a Voter Information Card, you can still vote. Just bring one piece of government-issued photo ID or two other pieces of ID when you come to vote.

Do I need ID to vote?

- Yes, everyone needs ID to vote. You can bring either one piece of government-issued photo ID or two other pieces of ID. [See a complete list of acceptable ID.](#)
- If you are on the voters list but don't have ID, you may have another voter with ID from your electoral division vouch for you. Vouching may be done on election day, but not during advance voting.

When can I vote?

You have a choice:

Advance Voting – You can vote at either advance voting place in your electoral division.

OR

Election Day – You can vote on election day at your designated voting place in your electoral division.

SERVICES AND VOTING OPTIONS

Homebound voting – If you are unable to go in person to a voting place due to a disability, you and your caregiver can apply to vote in your home.

- Curbside voting – If you are unable to go inside the voting place because of a disability, a voting officer will bring the ballot box to your vehicle.
- Braille ballot templates and a Braille list of candidates are available at all voting places.
- Magnifying lenses and a large print list of candidates are available from the voting officer.
- Assistance – You can bring someone with you to help you vote. They must be 18 years of age or older. A voting officer may also assist you.
- Language or sign language interpreter – If you require an interpreter to assist you, contact Elections Manitoba. We will do our best to accommodate requests and locate interpreters in your community.
- Elections Manitoba welcomes service animals and people who use assistive devices.
- Personal security protection – You can apply to have your personal information omitted or blacked out from the voters list to protect your personal security.
- No permanent address – You can vote if you do not have a permanent home. You can bring a letter to the voting place from a shelter or an agency saying they know who you are, along with one piece of ID.
